12.	<p>Objectives This course is aimed at presenting the transitional process in Poland and other Central/Eastern European countries after 1989; demonstrating specificity of anthropological perspectives as compared to other approaches applied to theorize about so called "postsocialism" in the region; showing how people differently situated in different social structures negotiate "postsocialism" in their everyday discourses and practices; and thereby, how they deconstruct homogenizing concepts and ideas which appear in both popular and scientific discourses.</p>
